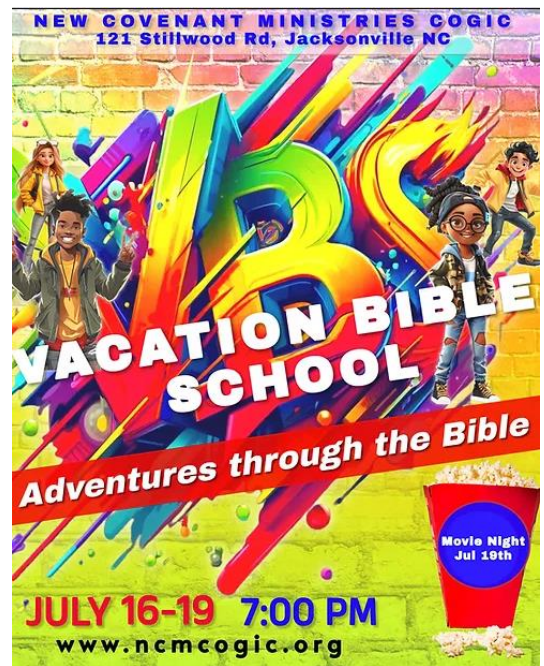

Zelophehad’s Daughters

Title: “Courageous Women of Faith”

Scripture: Numbers 27:1-11, 36:1-12



Objective: To learn about the story of Zelophehad’s daughters and how they showed courage and faith in the face of adversity.

Story:
